Harrietsham Gardening Society

The Gardening Society was treated to a very informative and enjoyable talk at our October meeting, given by Katherine Hook of 'Sloe Seductions'. The committee were a little



the booking but the residents of Harrietsham can clearly spell, they got the correct 'Sloe' and no contingent of shifty-looking, heavy breathing mac-wearers turned up expecting something a bit more risqué! Katherine's business relies on a burst of activity foraging for hundreds of pounds of sloes in the Autumn, which are then converted into sloe gin or sloe gin-flavoured chocolate truffles, or chocolates with a pure sloe gin centre. She explained the process from making the sloe gin to converting Belgian chocolate to the finished product which is all undertaken manually and is very time consuming. Samples were provided for members to enjoy; they were delicious and the products can be ordered on-line if you want to have a look at her website.

Also at the meeting Members were each provided with a pot and five Tete-a-tete narcissus bulbs. They will be planting these immediately into bulb fibre or a good compost, in two layers. Tete-a-tete are one of the best scented dwarf daffodils available and should produce 3 flowers per stem with stems about 8 inches high, They need to be kept away from heat and in the best light so as to provide a long cold growing season and should bloom next March or even earlier depending on our winter/spring. Members will be bringing these along to a meeting in Spring when we should have a brilliant display from which we will choose the best.

Angela Gatland, one of our Committee members, kindly brought along some apples for Members to taste, unusual but very flavoursome varieties which beat some of the more prolific but less appetising modern varieties.

As a new innovation the Committee have started to produce a list of topical jobs to be doing in the garden each month, with hints and tips on what to do now and also preparing for the months ahead. These are e-mailed to all Members; do consider joining and come along to the meetings with any questions or queries as there's bound to be someone who can help.

Thinking about it, there are a number of advantages to attending our meetings:

- In November to March we hold meetings in the afternoons which means you can turn your own heating off for at least 4 hours, what a saving!
- There is tea, biscuits and often cake available, with the opportunity to chat and make new friends.
- If you don't engage with a particular speaker there is the opportunity to meditate or practice the latest Mindfulness for your well-being,
- Parking at the Village Hall is free with no Payment by phone or App to contend with.
- The ratio of lovely eligible female to male members is about 5 to 1 so come along men!
- There is a real opportunity to learn more about all aspects of gardening free of charge, think what you would pay a solicitor or financial adviser!


Our next meeting is our Christmas Social at 2.30 p.m. on Tuesday 12 December; fun and games at this one. New members always welcome.

Harrietsham Craft Groups

Following the autumn random acts of kindness, the craft groups were very busy making poppies to extend the



village remembrance displays this year. Monies were raised to buy four trellises to cover in poppies for the outside of the church. £214.50 was raised in all which included cash donations of £26 from Harrietsham History Society and £20 from Glenda Dean. With these monies and a little more added to it we managed to buy two 4'x6' and two 3'x6' trellises, posts, spikes and fixings, two remembrance plaques and a roll of netting as we finished the one we bought last year. We then went on to knit and crochet LOTS of poppies to cover the trellises and, because the tree that we had the cascade on last year on the village green had died and had been removed we had to extend the cascade by 18 inches to fit the trunk of the other tree so yet more poppies were needed! Two of the trellises were placed one either side of the lychgate and the others one either side of the church porch. The displays on and around the font were put in place as last year. The wreath was added to by five beautiful felt poppies with beaded centres made by Stella who also helped by crocheting poppies for the cascade extension as did Lee. Additionally, we were kindly given some large poppies by Richard Cast two of which were attached to the lychgate.

Thanks must go to volunteers from Harrietsham in Bloom, Margaret Tuft and Terry McCann who helped with the setting up of the displays on the village green; to Antony and Mel Houston who used their flatbed truck to transport the larger trellises to the church and to Alan Riches who provided all the necessary tools and expertise for erecting the trellises at the church and Colin Weller who assisted. Thanks also to those who made videos and took photos of the displays and not least by far to those who worked so hard to knit and crochet poppies and/ or attach them to the trellises. We have more plans for next year to extend the displays some more!



At Craft and Chat, we did a Halloween project and at our November evening meeting of Knit, Crochet and Craft we took a well-deserved break from making poppies. Jacky learned how to crochet and did very well at her first attempts, Kora learned how to do popcorn stitch, Lisa learned how to crochet a round and keep it flat and Keira is going to continue her crochet journey by starting a hat next time and learning how to read a pattern.

May I be one of the first to wish you all a Merry Christmas and a Happy New Year!

Our speaker in October talked about Hopping in Kent. She told us about the people who came down from the East End of London to spend their holidays picking hops and earning some money. Some of the oldest hop gardens date from 1520 at Little Chart and 1524 at Westbere near Canterbury. In the 1880's the poles were connected by wires and stilt men started work well before the picking season training the hops up the bines. The stilts were originally made of wood but because they were really heavy especially in wet weather the wood was replaced by aluminium. They were about 13 feet high and attached to the stilt men with belts around the ankles and thighs.



Hop-picking holidays became all the rage in the East End and special trains were put on just for those wanting to join in. Hoppers would make their way to London Bridge railway station where trains would then take them directly to the heart of the Kentish countryside. The hoppers were paid based on how much they picked. The pay was based on a set amount per 'bushel' picked. The pay wasn't great but experienced pickers could make the same or more than they would back in London. The tallyman recorded how many bushels were picked by each person on two tally sticks, one he kept himself and one was kept by the picker.



While living conditions for the original hoppers were squalid and unsanitary, it wasn't too long before 'Hopper's Huts' began to pop up across the county. Families would share a hut with other families and would eat and sleep in them for the duration of their holiday. While most of these Hopper's Huts were eventually torn down it is still possible to spot one or two around Kent.

School children were allowed time off school to help in the hop gardens and there was much scrumping of fruit from the orchards by them.

Hops were taken away to dry in the Oast houses. It took 24 hours to dry them and in some cases sulphur was added to them to add flavour and colour to the beer. After work the hoppers enjoyed an evening in the local. In 1837 The Alma public house at Painter's Forstal kept candles burning in the windows to show the hoppers the way to the pub after a day's work.

In November we were shown how to make an origami Christmas Tree!


