

Top Tips

From Harrietsham Gardening Society

I wonder how many of you suffered from the dreaded blight on your potatoes and tomatoes this year? I think it was the worst I can remember, promulgated and exacerbated by the excessive spells of warmth and high humidity. The spores are spread and most infectious during what is known as a 'Beaumont Period', when for 48 hours the temperature doesn't fall below 50C and the relative humidity is in excess of 75%. We have had plenty of occasions when that has occurred this year. What can be done about it? Well, all of the fungicides available to gardeners to prevent or treat blight have been withdrawn although you can still make up your own Bordeaux mixture. this consists of 1 part copper sulphate, one part lime and 100 parts water and was first used at the end of the 19th century in the Bordeaux region of France to treat grape vines for downy and powdery mildew. As with many things its effectiveness was noticed by chance, grapes growing by the roadsides did not suffer from mildew in the same way as vines further into the fields – the vines near the road had been sprayed with copper sulphate and lime to stop passers-by from eating the grapes so someone put two and two together. It is the copper which affects an enzyme which means the blight spores don't germinate. It is preventative rather than a cure and has to be sprayed on when you expect a Beaumont period so keep checking the weather forecasts!

One other thing you can do is plant blight resistant varieties bred to not succumb to the disease. In the case of potatoes, Lady Balfour, Nicola, Cara, Setanta and the Sarpo group show resistance; in the case of tomatoes a couple are Crimson crush and Solito. A word of warning though, does the flavour of the blight resistant potatoes or tomatoes meet your expectations?

Thirdly, good crop hygiene is really important such as disinfecting greenhouses, practising good rotation, burning old potato haulm and earthing-up well to prevent spores washing down onto the tubers.

This year too has been a bumper year for slugs and snails. Again, any effective chemical control has largely been withdrawn and my experience is the little so and so's sit there waiting for the next feed of currently available pellets. The best, but costly, control is watering a solution containing nematodes over the area but this is only practical on a small scale. Copper rings, beer traps and eggshells are all advocated in some quarters but are only partially effective. One good thing is last summer was not particularly conducive to the spread of aphids and with an abundance of ladybirds they didn't pose too much of a problem. Even caterpillars of cabbage-white butterflies were in much shorter supply, however, do keep an eye open on your shrubs for the cobweb nests containing tens if not hundreds of brown-tail moth caterpillars as these are becoming more and more prevalent and can not only denude shrubs and trees of foliage but cause very painful skin rashes if you come into contact with their hairs. If you do see any caterpillar cobwebs burn them or (wearing gloves etc. of course) put them in a polythene bag in the bin.

Hopefully October will see you picking the last of your apples and pears which are certainly in shorter supply this year due to a very late frost affecting the blossom,

so do store these in trays without them touching each other and regularly look them over to check for any diseased fruit.

This month is probably the most ideal if you want to move any shrubs or young trees around the garden as the soil is still warm and roots will grow at a lower temperature than shoots so they should be on the way to becoming established in their new positions before next year. Cut back foliage to reduce stress and reduce, on young trees, any side branches by a third or so.

In the meantime don't forget to plant your autumn onions, garlic, shallots, broad beans and sweet peas to overwinter.

Finally, be quick off the mark whilst things are still fresh in your mind and get any seeds ordered ready for next year.

Harrietsham Network Christian Message

Have you ever done some long distance hiking? I'm talking about the kind where you carry your tent, sleeping bag, food etc and cover some serious mileage. I've loved the times that I've been able to get into the countryside, pitch a tent under the stars and cook on little gas fires. However, in order to be able to bring everything that is needed for that kind of hike, you need a pretty serious rucksack!

Imagine this – it's time for you to move house and I offer to come and help! When the big day rolls around, I turn up, ready to get stuck in. Unusually though, I'm wearing my fully loaded, massive hiking rucksack. You'd probably think to yourself that that was a bit odd. Imagine that as I help move your furniture from the house to the moving van, I'm puffing, panting and wobbling precariously under the extra weight of my rucksack. After a while, you would probably tentatively suggest that I consider taking the rucksack off!

This analogy links to a wonderful verse in 1 Peter 5:7 which says: "Cast all your burdens on Him because He cares for you."

Just like the idea of carrying the extra weight of a loaded rucksack and finding that it inhibits our daily lives, sometimes we need to ask ourselves whether we're carrying burdens that we ought to let go of?

The verse that I mentioned uses the word 'cast' which certainly paints a more active picture than other words that could have been used. Sometimes it takes a real determination and intentionality to let go of and leave behind the things that burden us.

Here's the best bit though – We are invited to cast our burdens onto God precisely because 'He cares for you.' None of us enjoy watching those we love carry extra burdens and the same is true of God. He holds out His hands and invites us to cast them on to Him because of His great love for us. You are never an inconvenience to Him!

So, I'd encourage you to reflect on whether you are weighed down by any burdens and consider whether you can reach out to God through prayers and in the light of His love and care for you, offer them to Him.

Harrietsham Network – Our Covid Journey So Far

This review was recently written and delivered by Revd. Millie Hart. A succinct summary that hits the nail on the head. This may be something to keep and to pass on to the grandchildren? There is also a Memorial Book to be kept as a historic document in the church. It can be used for people to write in memories of those we have lost over this time and also as a way at looking at the positives, celebrating local heroes.

For my husband and I it really started when our children asked us not to leave our home for anything, not to mix with anyone. This was the fear as we approached the national lockdown for all in our age group and for the vulnerable in general. This fear was also felt by me as all our churches were asked for information on how many spaces we had in our churchyards. The nation were expecting many funerals.

For some lockdown meant isolation from everyone. This would be hard for all involved. If we were living alone we could only go out for essential shopping if there was no one else able to help. For my husband and I it meant our daughter or our daughter in law would drop our supplies off at our back door. Then we would have to wipe everything down before we could bring anything into the house. Or it could be left outside in a secure place for 2-3 days before it came indoors. But we could cope, thinking it would be just for a few weeks, possibly even 12 weeks! We didn't realise this was going to happen for a lot longer....

And we were advised to wash our hands frequently, long enough to sing Happy Birthday twice!

For some the isolation meant depression set in. The nation's mental health was a real concern. Domestic abuse and other forms of abuse also was rising. However, it was good as we looked after each other in the village, and beyond. We looked out for each other by telephoning, knocking on the doors of anyone we knew to be alone, trying to make sure that everyone was keeping safe and had supplies of food to keep them going.

Some of the supermarkets provided time slots when only the vulnerable could go in. Everyone had to queue to wait their turn and follow the one way systems around the shop.

We were allowed to go out for exercise for just one hour each day, not meeting up with anyone else.

The general public would learn who we valued in our community. The NHS staff, carers, teachers, chaplains, shop workers, transport workers. These and others were all people who often would put their own lives at risk of the deadly virus by continuing their duties. We thanked our NHS staff by clapping outside our front doors at 8pm every Thursday, in appreciation for all they were doing. Some of us banged saucepans and the like as well as clapping! Personally, I also liked to catch up with neighbours at this time, we could check that we were all ok.

Many were hospitalised or isolated because of the virus or because of other complications caused by the situation. Even after recovering from Covid, many are

still suffering from becoming newly infected and also from Long Covid. We still have much to learn about all aspects of the infection.

And then there was home schooling, not easy for parents and carers, and especially if they didn't possess laptops etc for the children to do their work and send it into school.

And people were instructed to 'work from home' if they could. All this meant that the roads were quiet. The airways were quiet too. People who could exercise were out walking and the value of the beauty of nature in our gardens and on our walks was appreciated and the beauty and the peace became newsworthy.

We learnt how we valued our relationships with family and friends. Grandparents and grandchildren missed out on seeing each other, on hugging each other. We found alternative ways of non tactile acts of hugging, and even of shaking hands.

And then it was the summer, could it be all over? We were told we could 'eat out to help out' A hint that the hospitality scene could recover maybe. Although theatres and cinemas could still not reopen. Some theatres could use outdoor spaces for outdoor performances. Our church here in Harrietsham offered outdoor worship which was amazing in the quiet beauty of the surroundings with a trumpet for music, but no singing allowed for fear of spreading the virus. Our prayers were probably for the weather to stay dry! Fortunately, it was a good summer, weatherwise.

Mask wearing became compulsory on public transport in England and at NHS facilities from 15 June 2020 and became mandatory in shops and supermarkets in England from 24 July 2020. However, assaults on some shop workers and emergency workers sadly still continue.

I have reminisced, with our churchwarden, how the Dean at Canterbury Cathedral suddenly became well known as he gave his regular Christian message to the media, with one of his cats sometimes wandering into the picture, or even a chicken.

Technology was suddenly being used more. Zoom calls became normal and also, oh what joy, to see family and loved ones on Face time!

But then, disappointingly we faced Autumn and Winter with a second lockdown. Many of us found this much harder. Many continued to be hospitalised and there were still many deaths.

At last, though, there was good news about vaccines. The vaccines started to be administered and as we approached the Spring a new phrase entered our vocabulary. The talk was about if we had been double jabbed'! And it seems we are now approaching a time when we will talk about being 'triple jabbed'!

The Covid journey has been quite something......

So, what about where we are now? Will we learn anything from all this or just resume our pre-Covid madness?
